EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

West Central Missouri Community Action Agency (West Central)'s Community Needs Assessment 2023 is a part of the Results Oriented Management and Accountability (ROMA) cycle, which provides a systemic approach for collecting, analyzing, and reporting data. The Community Needs Assessment synthesizes the data and information about poverty. Key findings below are a cumulation of qualitative and quantitative data collected from many sources, including: Bureau of Labor Statistics, Food Research and Action Center, Center on Budget and Policy, National Center for Education Statistics, United States Census Bureau, Community Commons, MU Extension, community based organizations, faith-based organizations, private and public sectors, educational institutions, elected officials, health and medical providers, board members, employees, and most importantly, people who live in poverty every single day.

Key findings on the causes and conditions of poverty are in seven domains / focus areas: 1) employment, 2) education and cognitive development, 3) income, infrastructure, and asset building, 4) housing, 5) health, wellness, and social behavioral development, 6) civic engagement and community involvement, and 7) multiple domains / other.

The summary of final prioritized issues and the method used to determine these priorities is based on input from West Central Missouri Community Action Agency Board of Directors and staff. Questions presented to guide the prioritization process were focused on need, equity, and involvement / support.

Need: Is there a need to address the particular domain in a way that is not otherwise being addressed, or adequately addressed in the community? Would addressing this theme provide the greatest impact for the community well-being when compared to the other domains?

Equity: Would addressing the domain benefit the entire community in an inclusive way, with a preference for those who may be most in need? Work in which domain would be most beneficial to the entire community, with a preference for those who may be most in need?

Involvement / Support: Would family, neighbors, partner organizations, funders, others support an initiative in this domain area by contributing time, expertise/skills, money, or other resources?

PRIORITIZATION OF KEY FINDINGS

Standard 3.4 – The community assessment includes key findings on the causes and conditions of poverty and the needs of communities assessed.

West Central's methodology for prioritization focused on elements of the community trust process, a participatory process, each participant has a voice in identifying priorities for the Community Needs Assessment.

Prioritization resulted in the following areas in order of priority: 1) Employment, 2) Housing, 3) Multiple Domains / Other, 4) Income, 5) Health, Wellness, and Social Behavioral Development, 6) Civic Engagement and Community Involvement, and 7) Education and Cognitive Development.

Key findings, in order of prioritization set forth as the result of Community Needs Assessment Prioritization Workshop attended by Agency staff are as follows:

Employment

- Communities lack living wage jobs
- Individuals lack the skills to obtain and or maintain employment
- Employers lack employees

Housing

- Communities lack safe and affordable housing
- The community lacks temporary emergency housing for homeless or abuse situations
- •Individuals' homes are in need of repairs

Multiple Domains / Other

- Community and individuals lack safe and affordable childcare
- Individuals do not engage in available programs and services
- The Agency lacks unrestricted funding to achieve results
- Communities and individuals lack access to transportation
- Communities lack understanding of the causes and conditions of poverty

Income, Infrastructure, and Asset Building

- Individuals lack economic security / ability to meet basic needs
- Individuals lack savings for emergencies
- Individuals lack the ability to thrive due to bad credit, infrastructure, and assets

Health, Wellness, and Social Behavioral Development

- Individuals are food insecure and lack access to healthy, nutritious, affordable food
- Elderly and individuals with disabilities lack the ability to maintain an independent living situation
- Individuals and communities lack awareness and access to services for mental health issues and concerns

Civic Engagement and Community Involvement

- Individuals lack skills, knowledge, and abilities to enable them to improve conditions in the community
- Communities lack opportunities for people to thrive
- Communities lack volunteer awareness and opportunities

Education and Cognitive Development

- Individuals need basic education/financial education/budgeting classes/credit counseling
- Communities lack quality education opportunities for all ages (Early childhood education, elementary, high school, vocation, post-secondary, and adult)

West Central will continue the systemic approach, using these key findings and prioritization of needs within this assessment to plan, implement, and achieve results making a positive impact individuals, families, and communities.

PURPOSE

West Central envisions a region where people and communities are thriving. West Central's mission is to help people and communities reach their fullest potential by cultivating and coordinating resources, building partnerships, and advocating for change.

West Central's purpose for the Community Needs Assessment (CNA) is to utilized a comprehensive process to determine the needs and resources within the service area to lift individuals and families out of poverty and encourage self-reliance as an integral part of fulling the Agency's vision and mission. A tool that has moved beyond a best practice, the CNA is now a key resource for planning, application, program implementation, and evaluation. West Central will utilize the CNA as a tool to identify service and resource gaps in the community. West Central will uniquely address the identified gaps, needs, and barriers.

ORGANIZATIONAL STANDARDS

West Central's Community Needs Assessment includes each of the following Organizational Standards.

- **Standard 1.1** The organization demonstrates low-income individuals' participation in its activities.
- **Standard 1.2** The organization analyzes information collected directly from low-income individuals as part of the community assessment.
- **Standard 1.3** The organization has a systematic approach for collecting, analyzing, and reporting customer satisfaction data to the governing board.
- **Standard 2.2** The organization utilizes information gathered from key sectors of the community in assessing needs and resources, during the community assessment process or other times. These sectors would include at minimum: community-based organizations, faith- based organizations, private sector, public sector, and educational institutions.
- Standard 2.3 The organization communicates its activities and its results to the Community.
- **Standard 3.1** The organization conducted a community assessment and issued a report within the past 3 years.
- **Standard 3.2** As a part of the community assessment, the organization collects and includes current data specific to poverty and its prevalence related to gender, age, and race/ethnicity for their service area(s).
- **Standard 3.3** The organization collects and analyzes both qualitative and quantitative data on its geographic services area(s) in the community assessment.
- **Standard 3.4** The community assessment includes key findings on the causes and conditions of poverty and the needs of communities assessed.
- Standard 3.5 The governing board formally accepts the completed community assessment.
- **Standard 4.2** The organization's Community Action plan is outcome-based, anti-poverty focused, and ties directly to the community assessment.
- **Standard 4.3** The organization's Community Action plan and strategic plan document the continuous use of the full ROMA cycle or comparable system. In addition, the organization documents having used the services of a ROMA-certified trainer (or equivalent) to assist in implementation.
- **Standard 6.4** Customer satisfaction data and customer input, collected as a part of the community assessment, is included in the strategic planning process.
- **Standard 9.1** The organization has a system or systems in place to track and report client demographics and services customers receive.

RESULTS ORIENTED MANAGEMENT AND ACCOUNTABILITY (ROMA)

ROMA is a management and accountability process that is focused on results. ROMA focuses on the continuance of quality improvement to enable West Central to measure, analyze, and communicate performance. Key elements of the ROMA Cycle include assessment, planning, implementation, achievement of results, and evaluation. The CNA is an integral part of the assessment within the ROMA cycle.

ACTIVITIES AND RESULTS

Standard 2.3 – West Central communicates activities and results, including the Community Needs Assessment to Communities (public) through our Annual Report, social media activities, website, traditional news media, community outreach activities, etc.

Standard 3.1 – West Central conducts a Community Needs Assessment and issues a report every 3 years. The report is available in print and electronic and available on our website and is circulated in the communities via mail/email distribution, social media, press releases, etc.

DATA COLLECTION - SEE APPENDIX FOR METHODOLOGY AND TIMELINE

The Community Needs Assessment synthesizes the data and information about poverty. Key findings below are a cumulation of qualitative and quantitative data collected from many sources, including: Bureau of Labor Statistics, Food Research and Action Center, Center on Budget and Policy, National Center for Education Statistics, United States Census Bureau, Community Commons, MU Extension, community based organizations, faith-based organizations, private and public sectors, educational institutions, elected officials, health and medical providers, board members, employees, and most importantly, people who live in poverty every single day.

Qualitative data collection tools included surveys, focus groups, and informal questions. Qualitative data collected included strengths and challenges for youth, single parents, families, and elderly.

The cumulative data can be found in the Community Needs Assessment, which is divided into focus areas. Information gleaned for each section includes quantitative data, qualitative data, linkages, and resources. Word clouds (pictures) below include the key words collected from survey respondents as a part of the qualitative data collection process.

INFORMATION GATHERED AND ANALYZED

Standard 1.2 – West Central analyzes information collected directly from low-income individuals as part of the Community Needs Assessment. Data was collected through a variety of ways including focus groups, interview, community forums, customer surveys, etc. The data was analyzed through review of collected data by staff and Board, including a review of the collected data in the written community

assessment, with notation of this review in the Assessment's Appendix.

Standard 2.2 – West Central utilizes information gathered from key sectors of the community in assessing needs and resources, during the community assessment process or other times. These sectors include: low-income individuals, community-based organizations, faith-based organizations, private sector, public sector,

and educational institutions. Engagement includes: key informant interviews, staff participation, community wide processes, etc. Data gathered and used is met in a variety of ways including, but not limited to: summarizing the data in the Community Needs Assessment and its appendices; documentation of surveys, interview, focus groups, summary reports on data shared, etc.

Standard 3.3 – West Central's collects and analyzes both qualitative and quantitative data on its geographic services area(s) for the Community Needs Assessment. Qualitative Data is the opinions, observations, and other description information obtained through surveys, focus groups, interviews, community forms, etc. Quantitative Data is the numeric information e.g., Census data, program counts, demographic information, and other statistical sources.

CUSTOMER SATISFACTION DATA

Standard 1.3 – West Central has a systematic approach for collecting, analyzing, and reporting customer satisfaction data to the governing board.

West Centrals recognizes the need to gather information regarding customer satisfaction. All organizations need to be aware of how satisfied their customers are of the services they receive. Three key components if our process include collection, analysis, and reporting of the data. Our systematic approach includes surveys distributed to customers when services are rendered, data collected is analyzed monthly, and reported to West Central's Leadership Team and Board of Directors.




















Population Below the Poverty Level, Percent by County, SAIPE 2021









The Health Care and Social Assistance industry is the largest employing industry in both the Kansas City and West Central Region with over 82,000 jobs and 15,500 jobs respectively. Manufacturing and Retail Trade are the next largest industries in the area, with over 12,700 and 10,400 jobs in 2021, respectively for the West Central Region.

MERIC produces occupational projections that estimates labor demand over a 10-year period. MERIC categorizes these occupations using its Now-Next-Later method to help job seekers understand the training, education, and experience requirements for various occupations. Now jobs typically require short-term, on-the-job training, little to no experience, and/or a high school diploma.

Now occupations for the Kansas City Region Waiters and Waitresses; Fast Food and Counter Workers; and Cashiers. Ushers, Lobby Attendants, and Ticket Takers; Nonfarm Animal Caretakers; and Locker Room, Coatroom, and Dressing Room Attendants are projected to be the fastest growing Now occupations over the next decade. West Central Region with the most projected openings are Home Health and Personal Care Aides; Cashiers; and Fast Food and Counter Workers. Passenger Vehicle Driver; Light Truck or Delivery Services Drivers; and Home Health and Personal Care Aides are projected to be the fastest growing Now occupations over the next decade.

Next jobs typically require a non-degree certificate, associate degree, apprenticeship, some experience, or moderate to long-term training. 

INDUSTRY ANALYSIS

The West Central Region averaged over 82,400 jobs in 2021. The region gained 1,229 jobs, an increase of 1.5 percent from 2020 to 2021, whereas the region lost over 2,800 jobs from 2019 to 2020, resulting in a -3.3 percent employment growth due to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. In 2020, Missouri employment decreased by 4.9 percent, however Missouri employment increased by 2.5 percent in 2021, showing recovery from the pandemic impacts. From 2017 to 2021, the West Central Region averaged -0.5 percent compound annual growth for an overall decrease of 1.9 percent. During that same period Missouri's employment declined by 1.4

The industries of Manufacturing; Retail Trade; Construction; Wholesale Trade; Administrative and Support and Waste Management and Remediation Services; and Other Services (except Public Administration) had employment gains from 2017 to 2021.



KANSAS CITY REGION

INDUSTRY ANALYSIS

The Kansas City Region averaged over 540,600 jobs in 2021. The region gained 11,349 jobs, an increase of 2.1 percent from 2020 to 2021, whereas the region had lost 29,274 jobs from 2019 to 2020, declining 5.2 percent due to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. In 2020, Missouri employment decreased by 4.9 percent, however Missouri employment increased by 2.5 percent in 2021, showing recovery from the pandemic impacts. From 2017 to 2021, the Kansas City Region averaged -0.4 percent compound annual growth for an overall decrease of 1.4 percent. During that same period Missouri's employment also declined by 1.4 percent.

Kansas City Employment Annual Growth Rate



The Health Care and Social Assistance industry continues to have the highest employment in the Kansas City region, with more than 82,000 jobs in 2021. Retail Trade is the second largest industry, even though it lost over 700 jobs from 2017 to 2021, a decrease of 0.3 percent annually for the region.

Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services grew by 1.5 percent annually, adding over 3,100 jobs from 2017 to 2021. Accommodation and Food Services lost over 7,100 jobs, for an annual decline of 3.3 percent from 2017 to 2021. Accommodation and Food Services was gaining employment from 2016 to 2019, but lost employment from 2020 to 2021 and was significantly affected by the COVID-19 pandemic.



Now occupations with the most projected openings include Waiters and Waitresses; Fast Food and Counter Workers; and Cashiers. Ushers, Lobby Attendants, and Ticket Takers; Nonfarm Animal Caretakers; and Locker Room, Coatroom, and Dressing Room Attendants are projected to be the fastest growing Now occupations over the next decade.

Next jobs typically require a non-degree certificate, associate degree, apprenticeship, some experience, or moderate-to long-term training. Cooks; Assemblers and Fabricators; and Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers are projected to have the most openings for the Next category of occupations. Cooks; Fitness Trainers and Aerobics Instructors; and Physical Therapist Assistants are the fastest growing Next occupations.

Later jobs typically require a bachelor's degree or higher. For Later occupations, General and Operations Managers; Software Developers and Software Quality Assurance Analysts and Testers; and Registered Nurses are projected to have the most openings. Nurse Practitioners; Medical and Health Services Managers; and Coaches and Scouts are the fastest growing Later occupations.





Population with No High School Diploma (Age 18+), Percent by Tract, ACS 2017-21







ADULT LITERACY

Literacy data published by the Program for the International Assessment of Adult Competencies (PIACC) breaks adult literacy into three different "Levels". Those reported as Level 1 are at risk for being able to understand printed material. Those at the upper end of Level 1 can read and understand the text well enough to be able to perform small task, but might have difficulty understanding or drawing inferences from multiple forms of text. Those at the lower end may struggle with basic vocabulary or even be functionally illiterate.

The percentage at or below Level 1 for literacy in the report area is estimated at 19.2%, with a 95% probability that the actual (true, unknown) percentage is between 15.4% and 23.5%.















Housing Units Lacking Complete Plumbing Facilities, Percent by Tract, ACS 2017-21



HOMELESS RATE

The Missouri Balance of State Continuum of Care (Mo BoS CoC) is a group of agencies within the HUD designated geographical region working together to end homelessness. The Mo BoS CoC is a member-based organization comprised of ten regions, West Central's primary services area is Regions 5, 9, and 10.

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires that all Continua of Care conduct an annual count of people experiencing homelessness at a specific point in time (PIT). Both sheltered and unsheltered populations are seen, acknowledged and reflected. The information in the Point in Time Count (PITC) report represents the 101 counties within the 10 regions of the Missouri Balance of State Continuum of Care (MO BoS CoC) during the night of February 23, 2022.






Percentage of Total Population with Food Insecurity





CHILD CARE COSTS

For the 2022 Market Rate Survey, Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services, which is responsible for licensing childcare facilities, provided a list of all licensed facilities. Surveys were made available online to providers. Providers were notified by multiple email messages and calls. A total of 1,265 surveys were completed and providers were offered a modest incentive to enhance participation, resulting in a 39% response rate.

Surveys returned with no rate for a given category of care had no influence on calculating rate information for that type of care. Because of this, the total number of surveys for each type of care and classification varies depending on the number of providers that reported a rate for that type of care.

Caution should be used in interpreting results where there are few responses in a given geographical area or for a certain type of care. This is especially true with respect to Group Homes. Also, keep in mind that voluntary participation introduces the potential for self-selection bias. With respect to this particular survey, providers charging more than DSS rates may have a perceived incentive to return the survey in the hope of influencing state paid rates. Providers charging below or close to the DSS rates may be more satisfied and, therefore, have less incentive to respond. In addition, only licensed providers were surveyed. It is uncertain how the inclusion of unlicensed providers may have affected the results.





Paper surveys are entered manually into Survey Monkey by West Central staff.













QUESTION 13: DOES THE COMMUNITY ENCOURAGE PEOPLE TO EXERCISE THE RIGHT TO VOTE?










Which part of the ROMA cycle are we currently "in"?







POLICY & PROCEDURE

Title: Customer/Constituent Feedback System

Effective Date: July 21, 2022

Purpose: Individuals will be given the opportunity to provide feedback on their experience(s) as customers of West Central. Customer feedback is utilized to assess processes and to identify opportunities for improvement. The West Central Customer Satisfaction survey is conducted in accordance with this policy/procedure.

Policy Detail:

Each agency customer receiving assistance at any of West Central's facilities is asked to complete the customer satisfaction survey. A paper survey may be provided, or the customer may be asked to complete the survey on West Central's Facebook page, web page or via e-mail. The Public Relations Manager will work with the IT Director to set up the survey for electronic access. Each survey is to remain anonymous. The survey does not require contact information.

Surveys can be left at any West Central location, mailed to the West Central's central office at 112 W. 4th St. in Appleton City, MO 64724 or be completed electronically.

Paper surveys are entered manually into Survey Monkey by West Central staff. The Public Relations Manager coordinates entry at West Central's facilities and provides staff training for data entry.

The Strategic Development and Innovations Director will run a report from Survey Monkey at least semi-annually. This feedback report will be reviewed by the West Central Leadership Team who will address negative feedback by discussing, formulating and creating strategies, policies and procedures to improve customer satisfaction. Positive feedback will be shared with the appropriate Unit Chief, program staff member, etc. to assure proper recognition is received by those who deserve to receive it. Customer satisfaction data will be reported to the West Central Board semi-annually. Results will also be shared with funders via applications and request reports.

Unit Chiefs will share customer satisfaction data with program staff at least semi-annually. Staff input into services improvements related to this data will be sought. If changes to programs are recommended, a plan will be developed by the appropriate Unit Chief in consultation with program staff and the Leadership Team.




